



While we did not get a substantial number of pictures, we captured two videos that we hope to make available shortly.






RMSW's First Show - 1997


November 1, 2025, Workshop



What Does Your Workshop Look Like?

In September I asked for volunteers to highlight their workshops and kicked it off by showing my workshop in Lakewood Colorado. No one has reached out, so now it is time to show my workshop in Puerto Vallarta Mexico.


I currently spend between 4 and 5 months here a year, and my workshop is quite a bit smaller.

The workshop is in one of the spare bedrooms in the condo, and since we rent the condo out when we are not here, I must be able to put everything away (all the tubs PLUS the Molino) when we leave. Luckily, we have an "owner's closet," but it is not exceptionally large.

I have one 2' x 3' table – that is it for working space. All or most of my tools fit into 3 plastic tubs (each about the size of a shoebox) and my supplies fit into a decent sized tub that can be (if needed) slid under the bed.

While we are here, the plastic tubs sit on either the floor next to the table or on one of the nearby beds.

I still need to improve the lighting, but that might happen next trip.





The only power tool I have is my Goxawee (a cost effective Dremel-like device) and all my painting is done by hand. Currently all the paint fits in one small box.

Working in Puerto Vallarta can be challenging as the climate here is vastly different than back home in Colorado. While Colorado is a mountain desert, Vallarta is city on the edge of the Bay of Banderas, meaning there is a significant difference in the humidity. The biggest challenge for me has been in the drying time of glue and paint. Working in Mexico throws up another obstacle in that getting tools and supplies is difficult. If I need something in the States, it is easy to either go somewhere and buy it or order it online and I'll get it within a few days. That is not true in Mexico. Sure, there is Amazon, but they do not necessarily have everything I need and shipping can be a bit dicey.

This fact has made me become a more thorough modeler as I need to plan for what I will need to continue my build on my next trip, which is sometimes months in advance of when they are needed.

So, what does your workshop look like? I would love to see a few pictures and talk to you about them and include them in a future issue of the Scuttlebutt.

Does your Ship have a Mouse?


You have probably heard the saying "like rats or mice deserting a sinking ship," but what about a mouse or mouse stay?

"Stay mouse" refers to a part of the standing rigging. On sailing ships built before about the 19th century, the stays were of natural cords. These lines were looped around the top of each section of the masts using a spliced loop or seized loop at their ends. During the 16th century some riggers began to attach stays by splicing or seizing only a small loop into the end of the stay then passing the rope's tail around the mast and back through the small loop, like a slipknot. To prevent the "knot" from slipping tightly around the mast when it was use, a strong bulge was built into the standing part of the rope that could not fit through the small loop. This bulge was called a mouse or stay mouse.

Recently club member Bruce Bollenbach decided to try serving and making a mouse for the main stay of his Fair American, something he had never attempted before. According to Bruce, after six tries he finally made one that he was willing to share. He is going to stain it a brown-black and beeswax it.

Fantastic job Bruce and thanks for sharing.







The Sinking of the Marigalante

Most of you know that I spend a lot of time in Puerto Vallarta, and in a round about way, living here was the impetus in getting me back into the hobby. Long story short, I was looking for something to do as I had begun getting bored down here (I like to tell people that I found the limit to how many cervezas you can drink at the beach). I remembered that I was pretty sure I had a kit (the Bluenose that I'm still working on in Colorado) sitting

in the basement. I had purchased it in 2000 and put about 10 hours of work into it before putting it away. Now all these years later, maybe it was something I'd like to do. But I didn't think transporting it back and forth between Colorado and Mexico was realistic.

My wife was okay with me picking up the hobby, at least as long as I didn't end up with a hundred or so models around the house. Since my hope was that once I was finished with the kit, the ship would become part of the décor of the Mexico condo, I asked her what she would like me to make.

It didn't take long before she suggested a pirate ship, as Puerto Vallarta was once known for their pirates. Seems the same reasons we enjoy the area, the pirates enjoyed the Bay of Banderas as well. And until recently, pirates still enjoyed the Bay as the Marigalante had been turned into a pirate themed dinner cruise (yes, a tourist attraction).





The Marigalante had been constructed entirely of wood and had been an icon of the city for over 30 years and was famous for its nightly pirate dinner cruise, which featured acrobatics, sword fights, and fireworks. Yes, there are fireworks every single night in Vallarta, and around 9 pm every night, those from the Marigalante can be seen and heard from our patio driving our dog bonkers.







We returned to the city the day before Hurricanes Pricilla arrived (it was miles out to sea) with Hurricane Raymond right behind it (again, miles out gto sea). The combination of these storms created uncommonly rough waters off the coast of Vallarta, and after either a mechanical or electrical failure in the bilge pumps, the ship sank in a "shallow" portion of the Bay, somewhere around 180 feet deep. Marigalante was a replica of Christopher Columbus' Santa María galleon which was built in 1987 to commemorate the 500th anniversary its voyage to America.





I never actually boarded her for her nightly show and now I won't be able to. The ship's company is working on getting a replacement but that is months away.
