The meeting was brought to order by the Skipper, Bob Fivehouse, at 9.30am. Members stood to attention and recited the Pledge of Allegiance. Twenty five (25) members were present, together with one guest Rebecca Jelsema. No new members attended.

Finances:

Steve Lofshult stated that the 2023 membership drive is coming to an end. Total membership stands at 35, which is lower that in the past. Members are requested to make one last contact with past members, who may not have rejoined and persuade them to rejoin.

Steve summarized the balances of the respective Checking and Savings accounts. This month's expenses include a \$100 donation to the Wisconsin Maritime Museum to sponsor the "Modeler's Choice" award for the May ship models contest at Manitowoc.

The Club's annual financial report has been submitted to State authorities.

Old Business

Library Reorganization - Four Club members have been revising the inventory of Library books. This includes weeding out non-essential books. These will displayed at meeting. Some will be for sale, but the majority will be free to members who wish them. The extra space will be utilized for new donations and those that John McGann provided.

New Business

Model Display - members discussed at a luncheon on March 15, the status of efforts to organize a display of club models. Facilities under consideration includes those at Windcrest and the Denver Public Library. The latter facility was perhaps the most successful display to date. Library displays remain the most appealing, especially those at Littleton and Lone Tree. They have excellent display areas, staff that assist in monitoring the exhibits, and some offer publicity. Alice Sampson recommends the Library at Grandby that has excellent facilities and has been cooperative to date. The Board will pursue a model display for this year. This will provide incentive to members to improve modeling skills, and to complete models.

Three- D Modeling. Tim Brown stated that there is growing interest in 3-D modeling and encouraged the First Mate to find a volunteer to make a presentation.

Auction - the sale will be moved to November in order to provide time to better organize the event. Jeff Potter recommended that a volunteer be found to coordinate this effort.

Jay Phillips displayed the progress in modeling the SS. Maple Leaf. A description of this vessel was included in last month's Scuttlebut.





Decking for Wooden Ship Models by Martin Jelsema.

Before proceeding with a planking operation, a modeler needs to consider scale, ship type, false deck, deck beams, joints etc. The presentation covered sheer and camber, deck beams, waterways, margin and king planks, planking patterns, nibbling/joggling, deck furniture, treenails and finally, finishing. The presentation was augmented with photos, tables and diagrams in Power Point format.




Making Micro Chisels

Here's another article your editor stowed away but forgot to record the source. For more current articles I've made it a point to record the source. Anyway, here's Paul Payne's article on making your own mimi-chisels.

Some modelers still like to use chisels to make wood carvings.. If you have tried to buy small chisels for making wood carvings for small scale models, you have probably found that they are expensive, and even the smallest ones available are not small enough for some situations. Paul Payne, the provider of this tutorial, decided to make his own out of some dental burrs, which are made of high quality steel. Chisels of 1/32 width or even smaller are perfectly feasible with this method.

PROCEDURE

- 1. Ask your dentist for old dental burrs
- 2. Grind cutting edge at desired size and angle (this can be done by hand honing on a flat diamond abrasive surface.)
- 3. Turn a wood handle on your lathe, or carve the handle.
