PRESENTATIONS

Alice Sampson has bought out a company from a couple who developed a fleet of model ship kits for children. What is unique is that the past owners developed simple, modular jigs to turn out hulls, spars, masts and fittings cheaply. She displayed and demonstrated several of them The resulting kits allow kids to develop construction skills and models to play with. We wish Alice success in marketing these kits and hope the kids in turn become future Club members.

Ralph's presentation was to demonstrate how to make realistic gratings. He showed us how to set up the saw with a guide to do the multiple cuts both vertical and horizontal to prepare the base for the insertion of the divider strips which made the grating.

The key for making the gratings is to select the right saw blade type and thickness. The blades normally used are called slotting blades and have no if little offset. This will determine the size of the openings in the final grating. A special guide plate is set up by gluing a thin strip the same width as the cut to be made on a thin base plate. This guide should be the same distance from the blade as the width of the cut to be made. The sequence for cutting the base of the grating is important the sequence is to make the shorter, thinner cross grain cuts first and the long deeper cuts last. After all the

cuts are made the same guide can be used to cut the filler strips that will be used in the cross grain cuts. A few cuts using this method were made and discussed. After the filler strips are glued in place the extra material on the underside of the grating piece is ground off leaving you with a uniform good looking grating.

It was pointed out that you should make this grating(s) piece larger than the actual grating(s) needed. This will keep from having to do the set up again if you damage any of the gratings during the building of the model.

Note: The sequence that Ralph demonstrated was reversed. It should have been cut the longer deeper cuts with the grain first and the thinner cross grade cuts last.

Our log-term stalwart of Rocky Mountain Shipwrights – Edward Quam - passed late in August. He died peacefully in his new Virginia home surrounded by family.



Your editor hopes the next pages devoted to Ed and his participation in RMSW will continue to remind us of his contributions to our club as well as his giving nature and sardonic humor

Ed had been a RMSW member since 1996. He served as First Mate in 1997 and Skipper in 2003 and again in 2010. Ed actively participated in meetings, workshops and exhibits for 37 years. He had also been a member of the Nautical Research Guild for 45 years. Ed has won his share of competitions including our Exhibit's Modelers Choice Award.

The July 2017 Scuttlebutt featured Ed's profile. Several of Ed's quotes from that article follow.

"I began model building at the age of seven and have built hundreds of various types of models. First ship models were the Monogram balsa war ship fleet, I built all of them and detailed them as best as I could at the time, I was still in grade school and had an older friend who taught me some of the fundamentals and.

After grad school I moved to the Washington DC area and got involved in the Washington Ship Model Society ("WSMS"), where my mentor Bill Lee started me on the first wooden ship model, the Katy by model shipways. Then the Dapper Tom, Kate Cory, and a Whale Boat. In all I have built over thirty model ships of all types and description.

"I attended University of Colorado, University of Denver, and Harvard. My professional life was first as a cartographer, then I went to Defense Intelligence Agency and served there for 21 years, the last 10 as a senior Intelligence officer at United States European Command in Stuttgart Germany."

Like many other members, Edward was driven by the need for research, authenticity, and detail in his work. Edward said, "When things are not perfect I notice it right away." That's why I vote for patience, patience, patience. The waste basket is your best tool.
